

PREFACE.

WHILE in India last winter I wrote for the *Pioneer* a series of articles on the Economic Crisis. It has been suggested to me to republish these in book form, and this I have now ventured to do, because, however incomplete as a statement of the present currency conditions, I hope that at least it may possess some value as coming within the comprehension of the average reader.
