THE ALCOHOLIC "REPEATER" OR CHRONIC DRUNKARD.

It is a general impression that many persons are repeatedly admitted to the workhouse and to the alcoholic wards of public hospitals, as well as to other institutions because of their habitual drunkenness. It has not been known, however, up to this time, how many people are so admitted nor how many times they have been committed. Indeed, the records in most public institutions are so kept that they effectively, if unintentionally, conceal connected individual records or histories. An effort has been made in the following pages to answer so far as possible these questions and to trace out in detail typical, individual histories. Two facts have interfered with the complete success of this effort,

 The fact that little effort is made in most of the public institutions to identify the persons as they come again and again and to keep a record of their appearances.

2. The fact that the records of many of the institutions are nothing more than daily entry records. As a result, it is necessary to examine the records of thousands of persons in order to secure the record of any one person.

Most of the statistics presented in this study are statistics for New York City. No extended effort has been made to secure records from other cities, but a few such records are inserted simply to show that New York City is by no means unique in having this problem to deal with. Some of the longest records presented come from cities outside of New York.

MALE ALCOHOLIC WARD OF BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

NEW YORK CITY.

The records of the male alcoholic ward at Bellevue were carefully examined for the year May 1, 1908, to May 1, 1909, for the purpose of determining to what extent persons repeatedly receive treatment there for acute alcoholism.

^{*&}quot;Recidivist" is a more elegant term, but is not satisfactory because it is correctly applied only to persons appearing repeatedly in penal institutions. Statistics show, however, that there are many "repeaters" who do not appear in the courts at all.

The following statistics include all of the patients in the male alcoholic ward of Bellevue Hospital from May 1, 1908, to May 1, 1909. There are doubtless many repeaters who are not shown by these statistics, because of the fact that persons constantly come to the ward and give false names. There is no correction for this in the records of the hospital except so far as a person is recognized by the nurses in the alcoholic ward. The statistics, therefore, are very conservative, and absolute identification would undoubtedly increase greatly the number of repeaters.

It will be noted from these tables that twenty-nine persons were treated six or more times during this year, 104 were treated four or more times and 214 three or more times. It will also be noted that 4,584 or nearly one-fourth of the days' treatment for the whole ward was given to 498 persons or one-twelfth of the total number of persons treated, and that the average number of days' treatment for the repeater is about three times as great as that of the person treated only once. The per capita per diem expense of maintaining patients in Bellevue is given in the last printed report of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals as \$1.58. This would make the cost of treating the alcoholic repeater in the male alcoholic ward of that institution for this one year, \$7,242.72.

After the total number of known repeaters for the given year was determined, the records of all those who appeared four or more times during the year were examined for the preceding four years, and their complete hospital record in the alcoholic ward for five successive years was thus secured.

Of the one hundred and four persons who had been treated four or more times during the year, sixty-five were found to have previous records in the alcoholic ward. The statistics for these sixty-five are as follows:
