

"And at midnight, Paul and Silas prayed, and sang praises unto God; and the prisoners heard them, and suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken, and immediately all the doors were opened, and every one's bands were toosed. And the heeper of the prison awaking out of his aleep, and seeing the prison doors open, be drew out his sword and would have killed himself, supposing that the prisoners had been fied. But Paul cried with a loud voice, saying, Do thyself no harm, for we are all here. Then he called for a light, and sprang in and came trembling, and fell down before Paul and Silas, and brought them out and said, Sirs, what must I do to be saved? And they said, Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."

T is a strange story, abrupt, inartistic, improbable; the bones of a story—reported after the manner of modern stenography, in consonants—omitting all vowel sounds. But one thing stands out plain as a pikestaff, which answers my whole purpose with you tonight, and that is, that these two men, one a great preacher and the other a young business man, traveling with him, were severely tried in a variety of ways in a brief time, yet 'pulled together,' and were exactly
