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Scriptural Marks of a True Belieber.

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I.

Christ in You.

2 CORINTHIANS XIII, 5.

"Examine yourselves whether ye be in the faith ; prove your own selves. Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobates."

THE Apostle had said shortly before, that the Christians at Corinth had demanded a proof of him, whether or not Christ was speaking in him. And after suggesting that they had already a powerful proof in what He had done and said when He had been among them, he goes on to remind them, that there was for them a much more important practical question: namely, whether they themselves were Christians; whether they were themselves abiding in faith in Christ, and so were showing forth the marks and signs of true be-

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lievers? And in order to help them in that consideration, he gives them one very significant sign by which they could test themselves: namely, that "Christ was in them," except they were only pretended Christians, deceivers, because selfdeceived. It is important for us to remember, that this was written to those who had two qualifications, which many are inclined to think quite sufficient, without any further examination. They were all baptized Christians; they were all professing members of a Christian Church; and yet, to these, St. Paul, writing, as we believe, under the inspiration of God the Holy Ghost, exhorts them to examine themselves, not as to whether they were growing in one grace or another, or in all graces, but the much deeper and more searching question, whether they were "in the faith or not." And further, he exhorts them not to rest content with any mere superficial or hurried examination. but to prove their own selves; or, in other words, to use such tests that would honestly show them the state of the case. And then he proceeds to give them one test, which, if they failed to find present in them, would show that they were reprobates, or worthless, such indeed as our Lord has described as salt that has lost its savour.
