#### LETTER I.

NOTICES OF HUNTING IN THE LAST CENTURY.

Juna 1864.

DEAR FRIEND,—When you met me lately at Hampton Court, and asked me to supply any recollections that I might retain about the early days of the Vine Hunt, and

of its popular founder, Mr. Chute, my first impression was that I could produce little or nothing to the purpose. But on further consideration I am inclined to believe that, if such particulars are worth recording at all, there is no one now living better qualified for the task than myself: for I was intimate with Mr. Chute from my childhood to the time of his death; I conversed much with sportsmen whose recollections went back a generation before my birth; and I lived in familiar intercourse with many masters of hounds.
