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
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GENERAL EDITOR FOR THE OLD TESTAMENT

	A special study of the Septuagint Version of Joshua has been published by G. Holmes, Cambr. Press, 1914. The LXX. of Joshua, as will be seen in the commentary which follows, is of great value and interest. It often presupposes a more correct type of Hebr. text than the M.T., and sometimes shews wider divergencies which cannot be explained as due to textual corruption or accident or design. Apparently the Hebr. text of Joshua was once current in two forms : the one which lay before the Gk. translatuots.

> Peshitto, the Syriac Version of the Bible. A critical study of the Syriac text of Joshua has been published by H. Mager, Die Peschiftho zum Buche Josua, 1916, who shews that most of the variants between Fesh, and M.T. are of a secondary nature, and due to reasons of style or corruption in the Hebr. Mager has made it clear that Lee's edn. of the text (1823) and Walton's in the London Polyglot (1657) are based upon the text of the Paris Polyglot (1645).
