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For the following essay I have consulted more or less constantly the lectures of Hegel and the histories of philosophy by Tennemann, Ritter, Brandis, Schwegler and Erdmann, and the history of Logic by Prof. Prantl. I am more particularly indebted to the history of Zeller, and for bibliographical notices, to the manual of Ueberweg. I have used a paper on Aenesidemus by the late M. Saisset, in his work called "Le Scepticisme," a Gymnasium "programm" by Geffers "de Arcesila," and a monograph on the same subject as the present essay, by M. Thorbecke, in the Annals of the University of Leyden. I regret I have had little opportunity of using a paper by Prof. Kayser in the "Rheinisches Museum" on Sextus Empiricus. I have consulted without advantage the history of Scepticism by Stäudlin: that by Tafel I could find neither in the Public Library, nor in the British Museum, nor in the Bibliothèque Impériale.

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
